SEDLACEK: Call the meeting to 5 order. 6 7 This is Mark Sedlacek, president of Sunny Slope Water Company. 8 9 First step I would like to do is appoint the 10 court reporter, Amber Castaneda, for recording this 11 meeting. 12 We have, because of the events with COVID-19, 13 we have set up a call-in number. So what I would like 14 to do next is, first of all, welcome the shareholders in attendance, the two who are here today; and then, have 15 the shareholders who called in to introduce themselves 16 17 right now. And then, if you could spell your name. And then, when questions come up during the actual annual 18 19 meeting, that if you could introduce yourselves again 20 for the court reporter. 21 So I'll open it up to the shareholders who are 22 on the line. If you could introduce yourself and spell 23 your name. 24 MS. BEVERLY FALK: I'm Beverly Falk, 25 B-e-v-e-r-l-y F-a-l-k.

1 MR. MARK J. SEDLACEK: Okay. Thank you. 2 MS. SUSAN ANDERSON: I'm Susan Anderson, 3 S-u-s-a-n A-n-d-e-r-s-o-n. MR. MARK J. SEDLACEK: We have two 4 shareholders. 5 6 Any other attendees? 7 We just started the annual meeting for Sunny Slope Water Company. There is a third person who joined 8 9 the call, or fourth. Could you introduce yourself, please, for the 10 11 other two who haven't? 12 MR. BENNETT NELSON: Bennett Nelson. I'm a customer in San Gabriel. 13 14 MR. MARK J. SEDLACEK: Okay. Thank you. 15 For the court reporter, could you spell your 16 name, please? 17 MR. BENNETT NELSON: B-e-n-n-e-t-t Nelson, N-e-l-s-o-n. 18 MR. MARK J. SEDLACEK: Thank you. 19 20 There is a fourth person who joined? 21 MR. RICHARD CAMPOS: Hello. This is Richard 22 Campos. 23 MR. MARK J. SEDLACEK: Thank you, Richard. 24 Could you spell your last name? 25 MR. RICHARD CAMPOS: C-a-m-p-o-s.

2	So we have how many people joined so far?

10	For the last two who joined, I gave the
11	instructions beforehand. During the meeting, especially
12	like during the General Manager's Report, if you have
13	any questions, when you do ask them, if you could
14	introduce yourselves again for the record, because we
15	have a court reporter recording the meeting. So that's
16	all we ask, too.
17	Certainly, we are open to questions and we want
18	to hear, but if you would just introduce yourself again.
19	MR. RICHARD CAMPOS: Got it. Okay.
20	MR. LAP T. NG: Could everybody silence their
21	phones also or turn them off?
22	MR. MARK J. SEDLACEK: That's a good idea, if
23	anybody has a phone. Good point.
24	So I'll introduce the board members right now.
25	To your left is John Shaw, who is the

1 secretary. To your right is Peter Jeong, our vice 2 president. And then Steve Seiler, our treasurer. And 3 then Lap Ng, our assistant secretary/treasurer. To your 4 farthest left is Ken Tcheng, our vice president and 5 general manager. And we have Bill Frank here, our inspector of elections and board member emeritus. And 6 7 in the back, we have Troy Holland, our superintendent. Mel Alberto, our business contact. And then Karen Maas 8 9 here is the office manager. 10 So at this point, we would like to ask William 11 Frank, our inspector of election, to just be ready to be 12 involved in the questions. 13 And for secretary to read the official notice 14 of the annual meeting, which all of you should have 15 received.

MR. JOHN L. SHAW: First, the number of shares?

MR. MARK J. SEDLACEK: Correct.

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MR. WILLIAM A. FRANK: I'll be right back.

MR. JOHN L. SHAW: Okay. So the notice of the annual meeting has been published in the Temple City Life in January and March.

1 will be held at the office of the company, located at 2 1040 El Campo Drive, Pasadena, California 91107, in the 3 county of Los Angeles, state of California, on Monday, the 16th day of March, 2020, at 10:00 a.m. 4 The purpose of this meeting is for the election 5 of directors and the transaction of such other business 6 7 as may come before said meeting, and the determination of any matters postponed for hearing at said meeting 8 9 from the previous meetings of the shareholders. 10 Sunny Slope Water Company, John L. Shaw, 11 secretary." 12 MR. MARK J. SEDLACEK: Okay. And then 13 appointed Bill Frank is the inspector of election. 14 Can you please announce the number of shares 15 represented by the proxy made? 16 MR. WILLIAM A. FRANK: There are 2,676. 17 MR. JOHN L. SHAW: Okay. 2,676 shares. That 18 represents a quorum. 19 MR. MARK J. SEDLACEK: Thank you. 20 And then now requesting the secretary John Shaw 21 to read the minutes of the 2019 annual meeting, which is 22 a copy here. 23 MR. JOHN L. SHAW: I have the minutes of the 24 last meeting of shareholders. It's a 30-page document.

Request a waiver of the reading of said

1 minutes. If there is no objection. 2 MR. PETER C. JEONG: I make a motion we waive 3 the minutes. MR. MARK J. SEDLACEK: Okay. I waive the 4 5 minutes. Okay. MR. FRANKLIN RUEDEL: I have a question. 6 7 MR. MARK J. SEDLACEK: The question is are the minutes or will the minutes be posted? 8 9 MR. FRANKLIN RUEDEL: Is there a way we can 10 read them outside of this building is what I'm asking? 11 MR. MARK J. SEDLACEK: Correct. 12 MR. KEN TCHENG: Yes. 13 MR. MARK J. SEDLACEK: Is there a motion to approve the minutes of the 2019 annual meeting? We have 14 15 that. 16 And then is there a second? MR. LAP T. NG: I second the motion. 17 MR. MARK J. SEDLACEK: All in favor? 18 19 MR. LAP T. NG: Aye. 20 THE AUDIENCE: Aye. 21 MR. MARK J. SEDLACEK: And then, request a 22 reading of the Manager's Report from Ken Tcheng. 23 MR. KEN TCHENG: Okay. So for the year 2019, 24 water production was down 5.3 percent at 145 million 25 cubic feet.

1 Water quality. We continue to take samples for 2 water quality throughout the year. And if they all pass 3 Federal and State health standards. The cost for basin watermaster for the fiscal 4 5 year -- for the calendar year total just over \$900,000. That represents a 17.7 percent increase from previous 6 7 year. Water table variation at the Baldwin Park Key 8 9 Well is at currently as of March of this year is 208.9 10 feet. 208.9 feet, which represents a 15.5 percent 11 increase from the same period last year. The historic low for the water table is 169.4 feet; and the historic 12 13 high is 295.3 feet, which is in 1983. 14 So although we have good rains, the water 15 table, the basin still needs a lot of replenishment in 16 that sense. 17 L.A. County property tax went up 14 percent to \$15,402. 18 19 Insurance costs went up 5.2 percent at

\$215,000.

Power costs went up just .2 percent at \$411,000.

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With respect to projects in 2019, we replaced three main pipes. They were at Burton to Rosemead, that was done in February. Rosemead to Encinitas, that was

done in August. And Camino Real cul-de-sac, which was done in October.

In late 2019, we initiated the EPA America's Water Infrastructure Act of 2018. The objective of this project is to update the existing emergency response plan based on results of the EPA Risk and Resilience Assessment tool. Sunny Slope is leveraging its membership in the Public Water Agency Group or PWAG for support with the EPA project. That's a consortium of water utility companies that formed together to help each other in case of emergency.

We undertake an office remodeling project last year. The result of the undertaking is that we have some permit issue which the County and the State require that we do a seismic trenching on our property. We sit right next to the Raymond Basin Fault, and the State enacted a mandate two years ago that if you're that close, you have to conduct a seismic trenching.

So if you come into our parking lot, you see the long trench. That's the seismic trenching.

The finding of the trenching resulted in four liquefactions. The seismic scientist tells us that's not an issue. As a matter of fact, the County has permitting process goes to a couple of departments. One department already looked at the report and said it's

okay. We're now waiting on the structural and the safety assessment from the County for the final approval of the permit. If that all goes well, we'll start the construction of the project in July of this year.

We anticipate that when the construction project starts, that there is going to be obstruction to our shareholders coming to the office, because a lot of construction equipment will be going on in the parking lot. So we encourage our shareholders, customers to leverage our customer portal, which is on the website. You can, basically, look at your bill, you can look at your water usage trend, and you can pay bills. And so 90 percent of our customer services can be conducted with the customer portal. So we encourage you to take advantage of that.

Our phone system will continue to work. We have a call center. That if we can't answer your calls, it will go to the call center, and the call center will forward the message to us, and we'll contact you.

If you need face-to-face engagement, we can always accommodate that, and we will schedule an appointment with you to meet with you to discuss your needs.

So anticipate some interruption in the customer service access, in that sense.

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Also, in 2019, we conducted a feasibility study to determine the viability of constructing a new reservoir versus the rehabilitation of existing Reservoirs 1 and 4. Study results suggested rehab of the reservoirs was the better option.

The Reservoir 1 project kicked off in January this year. We are engaged with an engineering firm to determine the specs and scope of this renovation, and then preparing a bid package to go out for a construction bid.

So that work is in progress. We anticipate construction to start in November of this year.

Additionally, the company's accounting system was updated to the most recent version of Sage 100 Cloud 2019. This is consistent with our technology strategy of migrating mission critical business applications to a cloud computing infrastructure.

MR. MARK J. SEDLACEK: This is the Sunny Slope Water Company annual meeting. Did we have another person join the call?

MR. FRED NELSON: Yes.

MR. MARK J. SEDLACEK: For the record, we have a court reporter here. Could you announce your name and then spell it, please?

MR. FRED NELSON: Well, if the phone works.

1 have to go get my cell phone. It's Fred Nelson, 2 N-e-l-s-o-n. 3 MR. MARK J. SEDLACEK: Thank you. Thank you, Mr. Nelson. 4 MR. KEN TCHENG: Well, so my last two items is 5 Sunny Slope successfully implemented process change to 6 7 comply with Senate Bill 998, which extended the discontinuation of residential user's water services 8 9 only after 60 days for nonpayment of bill. 10 So due to the COVID-19 situation, we are 11 suspending any discontinuation in the interim until 12 conditions change. So anyhow, that's the new law that 13 we have complied with. 14 And lastly, in support of State-mandated water 15 conservation requirements, Sunny Slope implemented a 16 customer portal, as I mentioned, on the web. And the 17 objective is providing customers with water consumption information, such as billing invoices, usage, trends, 18 and conservation tips. To date, we have 514 user 19 20 accounts. And we would really encourage our customers 21 to sign on to this portal, because it has a lot of 22 current information for you. 23 That's my report, Mr. President. 24 MR. MARK J. SEDLACEK: Okay. Thank you.

And before we move forward, just really

1 quickly. For Fred Nelson, when we get to the point of question-and-answer, if you could acknowledge or give 2 3 your name first for the court reporter. 4 So the next step -- the next step, is there a 5 motion to approve the Manager's Report? MR. JOHN L. SHAW: I move that we approve the 6 7 Manager's Report. MR. MARK J. SEDLACEK: Is there a second? 8 MR. STEVEN R. SEILER: I second. 9 10 MR. MARK J. SEDLACEK: All in favor? 11 THE AUDIENCE: Aye. MR. MARK J. SEDLACEK: Okay. Motion passes. 12 13 And then we'll move on to the Annual Report 14 from Mr. Seiler. 15 MR. STEVEN R. SEILER: I would like to present 16 the 125th Annual Report for 2019. It is available online to everybody. If there is anybody present who 17 doesn't have one, we can give them. I have a couple 18 19 copies here, and we can provide them for you. So if 20 anybody wants it, just let us know. 21 MR. BENNETT NELSON: I can't hear. 22 MR. MARK J. SEDLACEK: Okay. Sorry. Let's 23 We'll move the microphone over when we go from one 24 board member to another.

So can you hear us now?

1	MR. BENNETT NELSON: I'm having a very
2	difficult time. I may have to disconnect. I'm so
3	sorry.
4	MR. MARK J. SEDLACEK: Okay. Understood.
5	Thank you.
6	Is there a motion to approve the Annual Report?
7	MR. LAP T. NG: I make the motion to approve
8	the Annual Report.
9	MR. MARK J. SEDLACEK: Is there a second?
10	MR. JOHN L. SHAW: I'll second that motion.
11	MR. MARK J. SEDLACEK: All in favor?
12	THE AUDIENCE: Aye.
13	MR. MARK J. SEDLACEK: Motion passes.
14	The next step is to announce the nominations
15	that are now in order for five directors for the ensuing
16	year. I'll look at the qualifications of the members of
17	the board of directors. Peter Jeong will provide that
18	list of qualifications.
19	MR. PETER C. JEONG: Yes. Hi there. My name
20	is Peter Jeong.

1	MR. FRANKLIN RUEDEL: How long have the various
2	members been members?
3	MR. MARK J. SEDLACEK: One-year terms each
4	time.
5	MR. FRANKLIN RUEDEL: The terms are one year,
6	is that what you're saying?
7	MR. MARK J. SEDLACEK: The terms are one year.
8	That's correct.
9	MR. FRANKLIN RUEDEL: How many terms then?
10	I'm trying to get have we had the same board
11	for X number of years?
12	MR. STEVEN R. SEILER: Can we take the
13	questions at the end?
14	MR. MARK J. SEDLACEK: We'll hold those to the
15	end. We'll make sure to answer your question then.
16	MR. JOHN L. SHAW: There is no term limits for
17	Sunny Slope Water Company.
18	MR. FRANKLIN RUEDEL: I'm not asking for term
19	limits. I don't want term limits. That's not my point.
20	I just wondered if there was voluntarily term
21	limits?
22	MR. JOHN L. SHAW: No.
23	MR. FRANKLIN RUEDEL: So that we do get a
24	chance for some variety or new, some of the other
25	fellows a time off? That's what I'm trying to get at.

1 No. Term limits don't prove anything, as far as I'm 2. concerned. 3 MR. MARK J. SEDLACEK: We'll certainly answer your question. We will answer your question. 4 5 MR. FRANKLIN RUEDEL: Franklin Ruedel. MR. JOHN L. SHAW: Okay. 6 7 MR. MARK J. SEDLACEK: Let's see. I think everyone on the phone heard the names. 8 9 Correct? 10 So there is no one else listed than what was 11 listed before. 12 MR. LAP T. NG: No. 13 MR. MARK J. SEDLACEK: So then, the next step 14 is for closed nominations. And if there is any other, 15 the shareholders present using the ballots provided, 16 provide them to Mr. Frank, if there is anything more at this point. 17 MR. FRANKLIN RUEDEL: I don't have a ballot. 18 19 Do you need the ballot? 20 MR. STEVEN R. SEILER: Yes. You voted. 21 MR. MARK J. SEDLACEK: Question came up too 22 about -- for anyone on the phone -- how they would -- if 23 they turned in a proxy already or if they have to have a 24 ballot. 25 MS. SUSAN ANDERSON: This is Susan Anderson.

1 We turned in a proxy already. 2. MR. MARK J. SEDLACEK: Okay. Thank you. 3 MS. SUSAN ANDERSON: It's under Keith Anderson. 4 MR. MARK J. SEDLACEK: Okay. 5 MS. BEVERLY FALK: This is Beverly Falk. 6 defer to my proxy. 7 MR. MARK J. SEDLACEK: Okay. Thank you. And then at this point, we'll go ahead and take 8 9 a momentary pause while the shares are tabulated by the 10 inspector of election. 11 So as soon as that's completed, we will resume 12 the meeting. So we'll take a short pause right now. 13 Actually, this is a point, yeah. This is for 14 people, since -- are there any other questions? We'll 15 answer your questions. 16 The number, it varies. I think some of us have 17 been here five years. I've been here ten. And it varies above that. 18 19 MR. PETER C. JEONG: I've been here 25 years. 20 MR. FRANKLIN RUEDEL: My ears don't work as 21 well as yours do, probably. 22 MR. PETER C. JEONG: I've been here 25 years. 23 MR. FRANKLIN RUEDEL: Is that the maximum? 24 MR. STEVEN R. SEILER: 30. 25 MR. FRANKLIN RUEDEL: Of all of you?

1 MR. JOHN L. SHAW: 34. 2. MR. FRANKLIN RUEDEL: 34. 3 MR. LAP T. NG: I'm the youngest. Five years. I just joined the board five years ago. 4 5 MR. FRANKLIN RUEDEL: You look younger. MR. LAP T. NG: Thank you. 6 7 MR. FRANKLIN RUEDEL: Not as old and stodgy as some of the others. 8 9 MR. STEVEN R. SEILER: Comparatively. 10 MR. FRANKLIN RUEDEL: You're an exception. 11 MR. MARK J. SEDLACEK: Okay. So for the other 12 shareholders, we're going to have one shareholder who 13 couldn't call in on the line, we're going to get another 14 phone line and put it on conference. 15 MR. BENNETT NELSON: This is Bennett Nelson. 16 I'm going to sign off. Reception is poor. Thanks for including me. 17 MR. MARK J. SEDLACEK: All right. Thank you 18 19 again for participating. 20 MR. FRANKLIN RUEDEL: I would encourage a 21 rotation of something, of some sort. 22 MR. MARK J. SEDLACEK: Understood. 23 It sounds like we have two other shareholders 24 who are still there. 25 MR. PETER C. JEONG: Susan, you had a question?

1	MS. SUSAN ANDERSON: Is this time for
2	questions?
3	MR. MARK J. SEDLACEK: Yes. Correct. We're
4	waiting for the final tabulations, so now is a good
5	time.
6	MS. SUSAN ANDERSON: Not only for myself, but
7	others who have been in conversation about the increase
8	for the reconstruction of the reconstruction project.
9	We're wondering about the charges, the charge is \$6 a
10	month for the next few years.
11	MR. MARK J. SEDLACEK: We'll have our general
12	manager respond to that question.
13	MR. KEN TCHENG: Okay. Are you still on,
14	Susan?
15	MS. SUSAN ANDERSON: Yes.
16	MR. KEN TCHENG: So we conducted, as I
17	mentioned earlier, a feasibility study on whether we
18	needed to build a new reservoir or rehab the two
19	existing reservoirs. And the recommendation from our
20	technical consultants is to rehab the reservoirs.
21	So we have Reservoir 1, which is the 4 million
22	gallon underground reservoir; and Reservoir number 4,
23	which is the 6 million gallon reservoir. And the
24	estimated costs for both of them are 6.3 million
25	dollars. So the \$6 surcharge for the next ten years

will cover 4.5 million, and then we'll leverage our reserve fund just under 2 million dollars to make up the total cost. And that's where the \$6 per month surcharge came about.

MS. SUSAN ANDERSON: I see.

Two other questions in regard to that.

Does the water company, are they under the limitations of telling the shareholders beforehand that this charge is going to go into effect like the electric companies do?

MR. KEN TCHENG: Sunny Slope is a mutual water company, it's not for profit, so we operate with less restrictions than a government entity, if you will. But your question, I think, is more how did we notify you of the increase? And there is a couple of notifications that went out. One is on your bill. We let you know that the increase is coming, so we do send that out a couple of billings ahead. And then in the Annual Report, we do have the president's letter that will state the increase as well. That's kind of the normal process that we have done throughout the past.

MS. SUSAN ANDERSON: Okay.

MR. KEN TCHENG: Did that answer your question?

MR. JOHN L. SHAW: When is the actual charge

25 going into effect?

1	MR. LAP T. NG: July 1.
2	MR. KEN TCHENG: July 1.
3	MR. JOHN L. SHAW: So it's a few months from
4	now.
5	MR. KEN TCHENG: Yeah. So it's effective
6	July 1, and we have been communicating this increase
7	notification.
8	MR. FRANKLIN RUEDEL: You made a six-month
9	notification then?
10	MR. KEN TCHENG: It's about three months.
11	MS. SUSAN ANDERSON: My second question is:
12	How did you determine that each shareholder should be
13	charged the same amount, and in taking into
14	consideration the possibility of charging some larger
15	water users more?
16	MR. KEN TCHENG: We again, the reservoir is
17	for the benefit of all shareholders, regardless of size,
18	because that's really your water storage, and it's part
19	of our distribution system. So we flat increased across
20	the base.
21	MR. MARK J. SEDLACEK: This is Mark Sedlacek
22	again.
23	It's like a duty to serve. We have had other
24	rate increases before that were volumetric based on the
25	amount of water consumed. And in this case, it is

Τ	everyone needs that reservoir to have basic water
2	supply.
3	MS. SUSAN ANDERSON: Okay.
4	MR. LAP T. NG: I want to add that the funds,
5	the \$6 per month is solely dedicated for the renovation
6	of the reservoir. Nothing else.
7	MR. KEN TCHENG: That was our board member Lap
8	Ng. What he said was that the \$6 surcharge applies
9	strictly to the reservoir renovation and nothing else.
10	MS. SUSAN ANDERSON: Okay. Thank you.
11	MR. MARK J. SEDLACEK: Do we have Mr. Nelson on
12	the line now?
13	MR. FRED NELSON: Yeah. I'm here. I can
14	barely hear, but thank you for your effort. I really
15	appreciate it.
16	MR. MARK J. SEDLACEK: Okay. Do you have any
17	questions right now?
18	MR. FRED NELSON: The question, I'm sorry I
19	couldn't hear the full thing, is what is an acre foot of
20	water cost or being sold for right now? Do you know?
21	MR. KEN TCHENG: So Fred, the cost of one acre
22	foot of water, when we add all of the costs of water
23	itself, plus all of the assessment fees, it's close to
24	\$1,000 an acre foot this year.
25	MR. FRED NELSON: Okay. Can I repeat? So

With all of the fluidness of the situation over the weekend, we rushed to set up this phone conference so that encouragement is if you don't need to come in, you can call in. This is our first time we used the phone. So with respect to that, we want to make sure that we support the CDC recommendations; as well as, abundance of concern for our employees, if you will.

MR. STEVEN SEILER: And shareholders.

MR. KEN TCHENG: And shareholders, yes. Of course, shareholders are most important.

But let me talk about COVID-19, just kind of reassure you from the water company standpoint. We attended last Thursday a research for water foundation where they brought in scientists to talk about COVID-19 and the water and wastewater system. And the main message that I got from that conference call is that our disinfectant use, which is chlorine, more than adequate combatant for COVID-19. Plus, the volume of water, if a person is exposed and exposed to our water, the volume it will dilute and the chlorine itself will rid of the COVID-19. So the tap water is safe from this standpoint.

The other concern is wastewater. We don't deal with wastewater, so we're not as concerned. But just kind of FYI that they did detect COVID-19 in waste by

1 wastewater treatment plant. So don't go next to a 2 wastewater treatment plant. They're not sure to what extent. It's not as certain, but they did mention that. 3 4 But as far as drinking water, we're in good 5 shape. 6 MR. MARK J. SEDLACEK: Thank you. 7 Another question? MR. FRANKLIN RUEDEL: I just was wondering if 8 9 we have some statistics on how our water is compared to 10 other water companies' water? 11 MR. KEN TCHENG: How hard of water or --MR. FRANKLIN RUEDEL: The water that we consume 12 13 or that you sell, how does it compare to -- in 14 Temple City we have, I think it's five water companies that service us, if I'm not mistaken. 15 16 MR. JOHN L. SHAW: That's correct. Five water 17 companies serve the city of Temple City. MR. FRANKLIN RUEDEL: And I would like to think 18 19 that ours is the best. And I would also like to think 20 that that ought to be noted. Because I think we have a 21 particular privilege of owning our own water company 22 that a lot of people don't understand. We have, I 23 believe, in the private enterprise, that a privately 24 owned water company can be used efficiently or more

efficiently than a government owned water company. And

1 I think some of those efforts ought to be brought forth, 2 maybe even an article in the paper or something to that 3 effect. And that also increases our property values while we're at it, which is a benefit to us as 4 individuals. 5 MR. KEN TCHENG: I think we can take a look 6 7 into it. It's -- Troy is in the back. But in general, depending on how we, each water agency treats its water. 8 9 Because for us, it's pretty clean water. We add 10 chlorine. Now we have a charcoal system, and we also 11 have a treatment system that takes nitrates out. 12 MR. FRANKLIN RUEDEL: A what system? 13 MR. KEN TCHENG: It's called granular-activated 14 It's a charcoal system that filtrates -carbon. 15 MR. FRANKLIN RUEDEL: Does that mean it tastes 16 like chocolate? 17 MR. KEN TCHENG: No. MR. JOHN L. SHAW: Charcoal. 18 MR. FRANKLIN RUEDEL: That would be great for 19 20 your teeth. 21 MR. KEN TCHENG: It's difficult, I think, to 22 compare agency to agency, because we deal with our water 23 treatment differently, and we pump from groundwater. 24 Some agencies take water from Metropolitan, which is

surface water. So there is a distinction.


1	MR. FRANKLIN RUEDEL: Can we look at it from

16	MR. JOHN SHAW: 30.
17	MR. MARK J. SEDLACEK: It's over quorum.
18	MR. FRANKLIN RUEDEL: 30 percent of the
19	shareholders are represented at this meeting?
20	MR. MARK J. SEDLACEK: With the proxy
21	committee, correct.
22	MR. FRANKLIN RUEDEL: That's what I'm saying,
23	everything combined? Sort of a poor showing, but on the
24	other hand
25	MS. SUSAN ANDERSON: Question. Can you repeat

1 the total number of shares? 2 MR. MARK J. SEDLACEK: Correct. The total, I can read it because it's fairly brief. Let me read it 3 4 all to you so you've got it. 5 MS. SUSAN ANDERSON: You're breaking up. MR. MARK J. SEDLACEK: Okay. JOHN L. SHAW: I'll second. 10 MR. MARK J. SEDLACEK: All in favor? 11 THE AUDIENCE: Aye. 12 MR. MARK J. SEDLACEK: Okay. Motion passes. 13 And I know we've been having questions and 14 answers as we've gone through it. Are there any other 15 questions that people have at this point? 16 Okay. All right. MR. STEVEN R.
